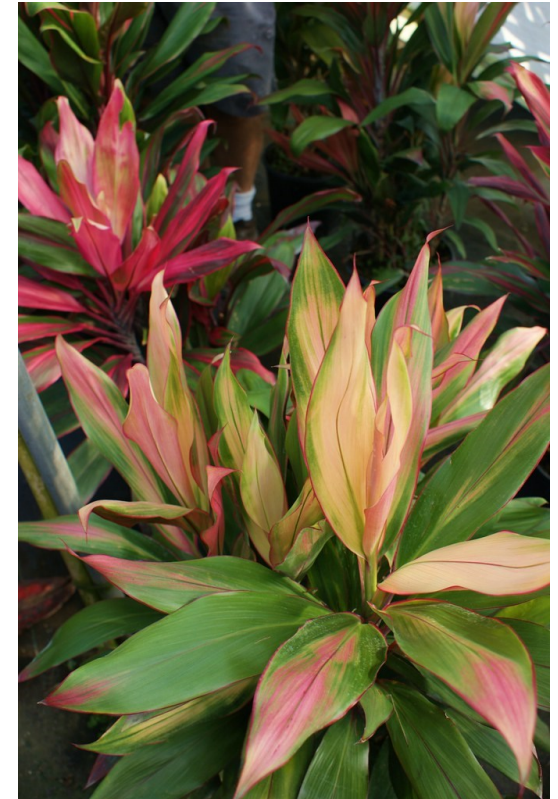


On some Pacific Islands, it is thought that growing a ti plant near an entryway brings good luck. It certainly brings a tropical touch, along with plenty of color. There are all-green ti plants, but more colorful varieties with red, orange, and pink streaks in the leaves are preferred as houseplants. Plenty of light is needed to maintain good color.

Light

Bright, including up to 4 hours of sun daily.

Bright indirect

Watering

Moderate even moisture, so that the roots stay lightly moist at all times. Use a pebble tray or humidifier to increase humidity. This plant can suffer in extremely dry air.



Feeding

Feed every 2 weeks during the growing season with a balanced houseplant fertilizer such as *Espoma Organic Indoor Houseplant Food*

Planting & Care

Grow with Black Gold® All Purpose soil.
Repot every 2 years in the spring.

Size

These plants can reach large proportions, but most likely won't grow to more than 5 feet in your home and that after many years.

Flower

A stem of white flowers can sprout from among the leaves, but most often will not be seen in the home setting.
