The large glossy leaves add a touch of indoor jungle to your home, reminiscent of the tropical areas of the Americas to which they are native.

The bold, lobed foliage of this leafy philodendron will add a touch of class to any shady corner or hallway where a bulky plant is needed. Give it room to grow as some cultivars can reach up to 6 feet and have leaves up to 4 feet.

Light

Provide dappled, bright light, mimicking what is found under a tropical canopy. Philodendrons can be acclimated to nearly direct sunlight in the right conditions, but they thrive is light shade. If you notice many of the leaves turning yellow at the same time, it can indicate you are giving the plant too much direct light. If you notice it getting leggy, it may need more light.

Medium light

Watering

Keep the growing medium slightly moist at all times. Allow the top 1/2 inch of soil to dry out between waterings. You will need to avoid overwatering or you can get root rot. If the leaves are drooping, it indicates too much or to little water.

Feeding

Feed from spring through fall with a balanced houseplant fertilizer. We recommend Espoma Organic Indoor Houseplant Food. In Winter, feed every 6 weeks.

Planting & Care

Grow with Black Gold® All Purpose soil amended with horticultural charcoal. They benefit from a occasional leaf cleaning/ wiping. Repot in the spring to a slightly larger pot. These plants grow best with somewhat restricted roots.
