

Although not a true palm, this chunky plant's textured trunk, topped with arching fronds, certainly looks like one. While it is, in fact, a cycad (an ancient group of slow growing plants), it would not look out of place on a tropical beach.

The leaves are made up of many leaflets with sharp points that should be avoided.

When it puts on new growth, it puts out a whole ring of leaves at the same time, this usually happens every year.

## Light

Put this plant in as much light as you can. A south or west window is best.

High/Bright indirect

## Watering

From spring to fall, allow the top 1" of soil to dry out before watering. In winter, the potting soil should be almost dry. Overwatering, or watering the crown (where the leaves emerge), can cause rot.

## Feeding

Apply a balanced liquid fertilizer (Espoma® Cactus Succulent Plant Food) once a month in Spring and Summer.

## Planting & Care

Grow your plant with Black Gold® Cactus Mix soil or well draining soil.

Set in good light, out of direct summer sun, and away from heaters in winter. It is a slow growing plant, and will need repotting every 3 years or when root bound.
